VOICE AND KEYBOARD

This collection contains songs which were composed for voice and figured bass (*basso continuo*). The editors are convinced that an adequate rendering of the figured bass by arranger and performer is essential for a real understanding of nearly 200 years of music (c. 1600—1770). In their opinion it is the underestimation of this problem which has hindered the true appreciation of numerous treasures of this period. 'Adequate rendering' of the figured bass means: composing the accom-

paniment in the style of the respective composer and work in the technique of the required instrument, and playing in proper balance with the solo parts.

The accompaniments in this collection are written for the harpsichord, but they suit the piano, and the pianist will adjust the playing to the instrument.

Apart from the realisation of the figured bass, the original text is printed with the musical notation in brackets.

"A HYMNE TO GOD THE FATHER

This composition of John Donne, 1607, is taken from Playford's *Harmonia Sacra*, Vol. I, 1653, and is enlarged. The original key is G minor.

It is doubtful whether the first stanza is major or minor. This is also the view held by Henry Purcell, who set it to music in his *Upon the Death of Queen Elizabeth* (1674) editions and considered the editors have decided in favour of the minor. They feel obliged, however, to give here the original text.

(In all three editions the doubtful chord occurs at the beginning of a new line, as shown above).
